At the core of the Tereo Teaching approach is a commitment to innovative education. Where our teachers go beyond classroom interventions to focus on initiatives which reinforce numeracy and literacy activities tailored to the CAPS curriculum and enriching the learning process. Reading for meaning also

remains one of our main focus areas. The success of our approach is manifested in the academic results our learners achieved in the final tests with a significant improvement in results across all grades. We have been able to fast track 6 learners this year and are fortunate to have a learner who has performed at an exceptional level, being accepted onto the gifted programme at Imibala.



In additional we have a learner, Christiano Jordaan, who only started school at age 11 due tragic home circumstances. He has proved to be an excellent student but due to him starting school so late, would not be able to continue at a mainstream school and has been accepted at Axios School of Skills, a technical high school. We have been able to obtain sponsorship so that he can complete his education and ultimately achieve a technical qualification that will ensure his employability in the future. Thank you to Morkel de Villiers for your generous donation and support with this wonderful young learner who has overcome so many obstacles and is yet so willing and committed to make a success of his educational opportunities.

SA Naval College in Gordon's Bay



The SA Navy is not usually a career our learners consider but we were very excited to welcome the South African Naval College at Tereo on Friday 8 December when the Commander and her team visited Tereo and made a generous donation of much needed books, food and underwear to our school. One of the naval officers very fittingly noted that the word Tereo means " to give" and that they also wanted "to give" to the community by donating to our school. Thank you, South African Naval College! The SA Navy College will also be providing our Grade 7 learners an opportunity to spend the day at the training facility in Gordons' Bay during 2024 to provide show them what career options are available to them after school.

Any donation made is fully tax deductible.

Looking forward to 2024 - this year has been particularly tough with the school flooded 5 times, some of our learners exposed to terrible trauma within their home environments including physical abuse, sexual assault, rape, murder and a learner being hit by a stray bullet.

With the floods doing permanent damage to our school, we have managed to find a suitable property in Strand which we have purchased through fundraising and our chairlady. The stand comprises 4000m2 of land with an existing building which would be suitable (after alterations) to house our administration offices, kitchen, hall, ablution facilities, storerooms and computer learning centre. The size of the property also means we can now have playgrounds and some sport facilities for our learners.

Our intention is to move (hopefully) by the end of the first term 2024, this will allow for rezoning, plans and alterations to be completed.

How you can help... Funding is required for - the alterations, classrooms for Grade 1-7, toilet facilities, trauma counselling and play therapy room, library, fencing, and sundry costs that go with a move of this nature.
